Also an article on the dangers of Barley Grass

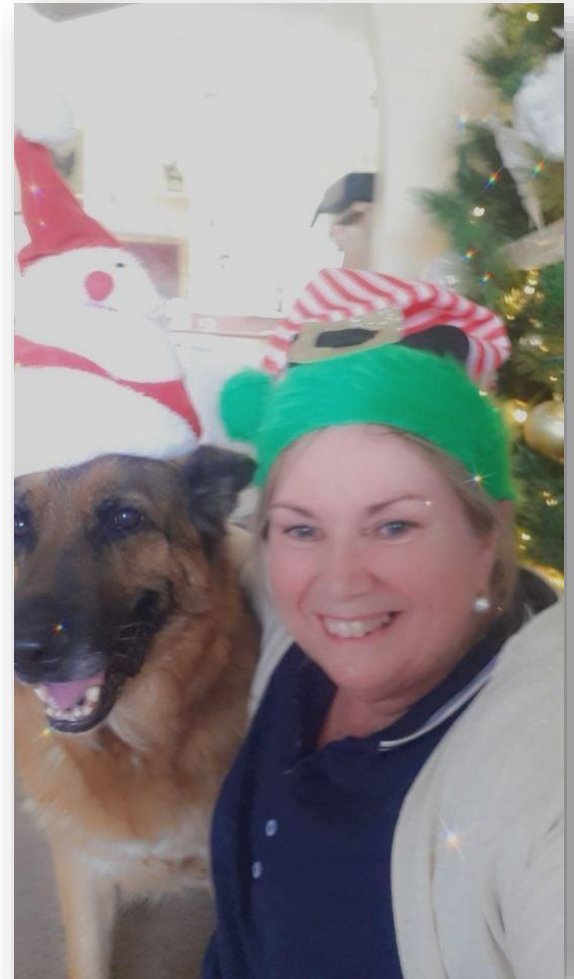
And of course there’s a new news report from our very own roving reporter Michael with all the news of a new sister.

Presidents Corner

As we draw towards the end of the year, whilst it feels like a mad dash towards the finish, and more often than not, it is; it is important to reflect upon the journey that has brought us to the close of another year.

Another year of Covid-19 it has been, and whilst it is becoming our new normal, there remain a number of uncertainties and new territory for us to traverse in 2022, namely:

- The Covid-19 Protection Framework, aka the traffic light system;
 - DogsNZ affiliated events with mandatory vaccination and CVC's; and
 - SIGSL trainings and gatherings; and
- Fundraising Opportunities; and
- Membership.

Covid-19 and Covid-19 Vaccine Certificates

DogsNZ Events

As advised by DogsNZ; all affiliated DogsNZ events require mandatory vaccinations and CVC's, whilst individual clubs can determine how their events/gatherings can run. This makes it clear that all participants and spectators must be vaccinated in order to attend, exhibit and/or compete in a DogsNZ affiliated event. As we draw closer to SIGSL's next show in early 2022, we will be in touch with the ways in which we will collect your CVC's so as to make entry to the show and the day(s) itself run as smoothly as possible.

SIGSL Trainings

Committee met on 6 December 2021, and discussed amongst other things, how SIGSL trainings will operate under the traffic light system. On the basis that we are a 'gathering', for the purpose of the legislation, we are able to continue to operate at 'orange', provided training numbers are below 50 people at one time, without making CVC's mandatory. If however, we move to 'red' CVC's will be required to attend training. There will be communication on this as and when we move within the traffic light system.

Fundraising

Due to a number of cancellations with our usual BBQ fundraising events and other Covid-19 restrictions, we have been limited in our ability to raise funds for 2021, however, the Halswell Bacon fundraiser was fantastic, we have sold the old agility gear, tired couches and are looking at running a chocolate fundraiser in the New Year. Thanks to everyone who has made

donations, purchased and/or given their time to our fundraising efforts. We will keep you posted with the upcoming fundraising events. If you can lend a hand, please let us know.

Membership

I want to acknowledge and say a huge thank you to the local breeders who support and refer their new puppy owners to our club for domestic and competition training. This has been great for the growth of the club's membership and also contributes to SIGSL having a growing presence at both obedience and agility events. We are looking at hosting show (conformation) training days once a month to add further depth to our newer members exhibiting at conformation shows. If you would like to send your new puppy owners to us, please get them to contact myself or one of the other trainers.

Vice President/Ordinary Committee Member

In October 2021, Andy Connor advised that he would be stepping down from the Committee and the Vice President role. Again Andy, thank you and your family for your service to our club. In December 2021, the Main Committee appointed Jane Burgess (nee Dalzell) to the Vice President role and retained Wayne Middleton as the eighth ordinary Committee Member, in accordance with clause 11(a)(3) of the SIGSL Constitution. Congratulations Jane and Wayne and thank you for your contributions to the club.

Lease

At the User Group meetings of the Canterbury Agricultural Park, it has been made abundantly clear that we need to legitimise our interest and existence at the Canterbury Agricultural Park. Our relationship with the Halswell Pony Club is going from strength to strength which is of great importance on the basis that:

- a) their lease boundary sits just outside our clubrooms which means that, we need to continue to work with them now and in the future when we hold events;
- b) their lease renewal of 3x 10 years is proceeding through the last phases of acceptance; and
- c) as the only other volunteer organisation within the park, they can give us insight into the hoops that will exist when we embark on exploring obtaining a lease.

Without a lease, our existence at the Canterbury Agricultural Park is uncertain and our interests are second rate to all other organisations that hold a legitimate interest in the land. We will keep you updated in the New Year with any developments on this front.

Get To know your Committee

Hello SIGSL Members

The Beginning

My name is Barry Black and in partnership with my wife Annie we own Blackash Kennels and over many years with Von Gavarol kennel's my parent's kennels working together .

I have been involved in the shepherd breed since the day I was born, being raised around German shepherds as a young fella I'd always enjoy playing with puppies. I'd help mum train the dogs for a show doing laps of the paddock on the Massey tractor and I'd watch Dad cut up livestock around our neighborhood to feed the shepherds

My 1st shepherd I trained and showed by myself was breed by Mac McNally in Ashburton a lovely bitch Paderborn Xotic. I traveled to show's all over NZ. Back then we would show the Males on a Saturday and bitches on a Sunday as the numbers at shepherd show's would be well over 150 entries.

When at a young age my favorite show was the Easter show in Wellington such good people like Harry Walker and Frank Stills made the show's extra special. I would sit in the back of a Morris 1100 bread van with lots of dogs heading up to catch the ferry in time, sometimes we would have home killed pork in the Van as well to sell to Harry. It helped Mum and Dad with the cost of going up to the show.

Alma von Gavarol a female bitch ahead of her time and achieved winning the gold 3 years in a row under 3 different SV judges at the Wellington show. A record that will never be equaled. When the show entries were massive classes. Junior bitch class normally would have 30 plus entries. No long coat classes back then, we sold them as Pets with no papers.

I started showing Dogs for my parents at a young age and I remember watching other handlers and learning from them. To handle a shepherd to the best of the ability of that dog is an art form and a good handler knows the faults of the dog and can handle in a way to counter those faults. Angela Radford from Cleverland Kennels showed a Sable dog Cleverland Young Turk - watching those two in the ring work as a team was an honour. Also, the Top Kennels in NZ at the time - San Ricco - to watch and learn from Christine & Wayne back then was amazing. I was also very lucky to be trained by David Hall from Gayvilles kennels UK. David was a professional handler in the UK. It is great to see young Shikarna McNally a natural handler, I hope she carries on in years to come, already having great success handling our Girls

San Ricco Morgan was my first Male I owned back in Mid 80's, as a young lad Morgan was strong, powerful and that is where my desire for strong males started.

Training and handling Phillipp is a memory that I will never lose, he was a male who if you saw him at a show he just attracted your eye to him and he sure had a motor on him. The last Easter show we attended was under an SV judge Margit van Dorssen. She called Phillipp out 1st and he went onto Best in Show, she asked me to do more rounds saying this dog loves to run. Phillipps movement was stunning. We also entered Phillipp in the National 2008 when a group from the South Island went up. In the individual the German judge went to check Phillipp's teeth, and the judge was wearing a large tie, Phillipp decided to bite the tie and lock onto when he bent down. I couldn't believe my eyes seeing Phillipp locked onto the SV German's tie but as quick as it happened the judge said something in German and Phillipp let go. He went on to win the Gold - little shit.

Breeding & Caring for our Shepherd's

We are lucky to have a lifestyle block which allows our shepherds plenty of room while mixing with sheep, lambs, chickens, cattle I feel what is important in the shepherd is character. Ani does such a super job whelping and raising our little shepherds. When whelping we set up a whelping pen inside with camera on to our bedroom etc. When a bitch starts whelping you can ask Annie, I'm a nervous wreck and only good for giving needles if needed. When we have a litter of puppies and I'm on the ride on mower, I still zoom past them in their play pen, the noise of the cutter and grass flying everywhere is great test. Quite often I walk outside and fire 4/5 shots from my starting pistol and not make a thing about it. We run our dogs everyday down the back track for Minimum of 2km. We use a horse racing track to train prior to shows and the Rakaia River is also great for training doing 5 minute swims.

Each dog has its own diet and it's a matter on working out what is the best for your shepherd. We get trucked to us our fresh beef, tripe, chicken, dog roll's and we prefer grain free dog biscuits. We also add oils, vitamins, and natural products to help keep our shepherds healthy and strong.

My parents have imported to NZ over the year's more than 30 German Shepherds. This has allowed us and other kennels throughout NZ and Australia build depth on their bloodlines

This gets me to my point on bloodlines breeding. There are three key items I check before I even think of a possible mating. Number 1 - Hips/Elbows scores these must be very low for me. Number two - Dm (Clear or Carrier) we mate our girls to clear dogs. Number three and most important Character/Temperament.

Of course, after running over those three steps - then I look into the bloodlines and try to work out the best for our girls. For example, we should all know the faults of our shepherds that we own. If I had a bitch with a short steep croup, I would be looking for a male with correct length/lay of croup. Also, I see no sense in selecting a stud dog that already has the bloodlines

throughout NZ. Introducing new bloodlines like we did with Macho vom Larmorak to NZ has paid off. No other Kennel has those lines making their breed worth very strong.

Each kennel tends to have their own type in their kennel, for Blackash we aim for strong color, a clear difference between the sexes and natural movement. I tend to work out the bloodline breeding program (importing semen etc.) and Annie does the rest in raising our shepherds. Working together is key and yes, it has its moments, but the reward is seeing our shepherds in loving homes and receiving great feedback year after year. We can all breed Multi in Show winner's but the true reward for us is the great feedback we receive from people owning a Blackash shepherd

The Future

Annie and I have joined the committee to help the club into the next ten years.

We have a great team on the committee and most importantly is we all work as a team for the club and the German Shepherd

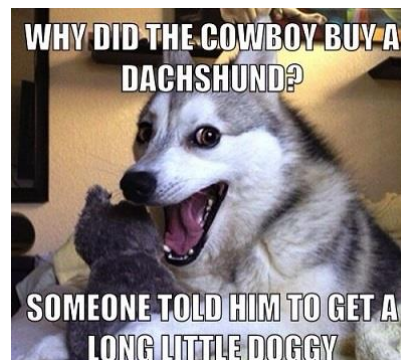

Vale For Ellie Vom Eigerwand – (Loved and Owned by Jane and Shaun Dalzell)

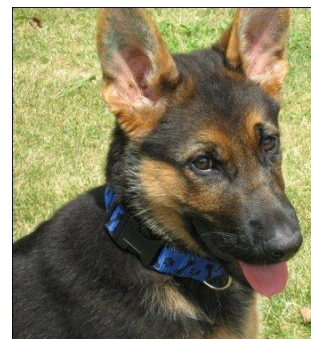
Ellie, Elle, Elle Belle, Smelly Ellie or her full name – Ellie Vom Eigerwand when she was being a ratbag

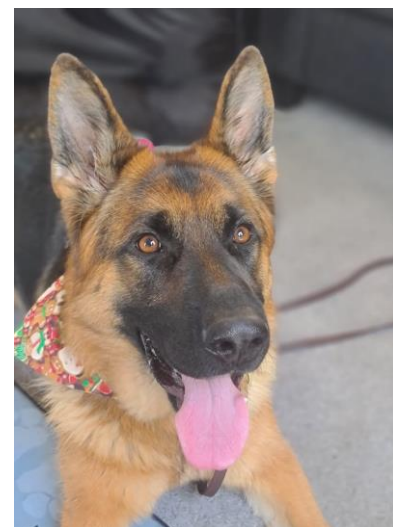

Dog Health - Pyometra

Pyometra can be a tragic illness that is found in reproductively intact bitches. The condition can be a medical emergency but knowing the risk factors and signs to look for can make early detection possible. The earlier pyometra is detected, the better the chance for successful treatment.

SYMPTOMS: Pyometra is typically seen in middle-age bitches over the age of 6 years, but can happen as early as the [first heat cycle](#). It usually occurs within 12 weeks after a heat cycle. Pyometra can occur in either a closed or open cervix. In a closed pyometra, the bitch will show signs of illness such as an increase in drinking and urinating, lethargy, [vomiting](#), and abdominal distention. A closed pyometra is likely to cause more severe signs because of the retention of discharge, so it is important to get your dog to your veterinarian if you observe any symptoms. In an open pyometra, you may see bloodstained, thick vaginal discharge, but the bitch may not act as ill. Still, this can become a life threatening situation without proper veterinarian management

CAUSES: The complete cause is not fully understood, but does appear to be due to multiple factors. It is believed that the main cause is repeated exposure of the endometrium (the uterus lining) to high concentrations of estrogen during the heat cycle (estrus), followed by high concentrations of progesterone during diestrus (period following the heat cycle when the female is no longer receptive to the male).

This leads to the development of cystic endometrial hyperplasia, which occurs when the lining of the uterus thickens. If a bitch is not bred, the uterus lining continues to thicken, stimulated by the release of the progesterone and estrogen. The uterus lining can then form pockets where bacteria may develop and lead to pyometra. The bacterial infection is typically caused by E. coli that moves from the vagina through the cervix during estrus.

DIAGNOSIS: To help diagnose pyometra, your veterinarian will likely run bloodwork to look for an elevation in white blood cells. A radiograph or the preferred method, an ultrasound, of the abdomen should also be performed. These tests will show an enlarged uterus if pyometra is present. Since pyometra can occur during the same time as pregnancy, [pregnancy must be ruled out](#) as the cause of an enlarged uterus.

TREATMENT: Pyometra can be treated surgically or with medication. The [surgical treatment of spaying](#) is the preferred treatment in all bitches not intended for breeding, those older than 4 years old that have chronic uterine changes, and those that are ill. Spaying is the only treatment that is guaranteed to prevent a pyometra from recurring.

Medical management with hospitalization, fluids, prostaglandins and the appropriate use of proper antibiotics can be tried in bitches that are still desired to be bred. If medical treatment is not successful after five days, spaying should be considered. If treatment does prove to be successful, the bitch should then be bred on her next heat cycle.

Personal story – Earlier this year Viva became ill and had been licking her privates quite incessantly, her vulva was also swollen more than with a usual heat cycle. Off to the vet we went and she was diagnosed with Pyometra. Rather than do emergency surgery there and then, she was prescribed a few days of antibiotics and to see how she went with that. She did perk up when the antibiotics kicked in, but the morning after finishing the antibiotics she was quite ill again and she also went blind overnight. I was taking her outside during the night to go pee and she banged into the door frame – I thought that’s a bit weird but oh well must be just a bit wobbly. In the morning she was banging into even more things and when I looked into her eyes they had turned into a red type of colour instead of brown. We went back to the vet and he was quite amazed that the infection had made that kind of reaction in her – he said its not unheard of but its rare. She was scheduled for surgery the next day and had a full hysterectomy. She was prescribed a lot of antibiotics, painkillers and eye drops for her eyes which returned to normal sight after a few days.

Sadly Viva was not able to make babies, she cycled every four months from when she had her first cycle and when she turned 2 and half, we tried to artificially inseminate her with fresh semen – she did not take – We were given the option of giving her testosterone drops which the vet said may help in that it would suppress her cycle and give her body a chance to recover from the cycle and therefore be ready for puppies to grow. When a dog comes into season its body gets ready to accept babies – all it needs is the male semen. When that doesn’t happen the body has to go back to normal – with Viva – her body was not getting the chance to get back to normal – but with testosterone drops it could also change her temperament – I believe in nature taking its course to a certain degree and did not want to be messing with her in that way – we tried again with natural mating’s several times and she had us fooled good and proper one time insisting she was pregnant – had all the signs but upon ultra sound – no puppies, after this her cycle changed and she was coming into season every 2 months- we tried again for puppies but to no avail – As she was six after the last attempt, she was too old to be having a first litter and so we stopped trying – she was seven years old when she got pyometra.

Pyometra can often be fatal so know what to look for and be aware – there are two types – Open Pyometra – so the infection is able to leak out of the vagina – Closed Pyometra – nastier as it is not able to leak out and so builds up inside.

Booming Barley Grass Poses Risk To Dogs –

Penny Wright occasionally lets her beloved Kona romp around Bexley Park but is sure to keep the fox terrier on a tight lead.

Wrights caution is justified as the retired vet is acutely aware of the dangers posed by barley grass.

It is so prevalent at the popular dog park she has put up warning signs for unsuspecting owners, claiming the city council is not doing enough to control the grass

Barley grass long tailed seeds can migrate through a dog's coat skin and ear canal to cause serious health issues.

If it gets into the middle ear, it can be very painful and affect their hearing. It can certainly do some damage Wright said.

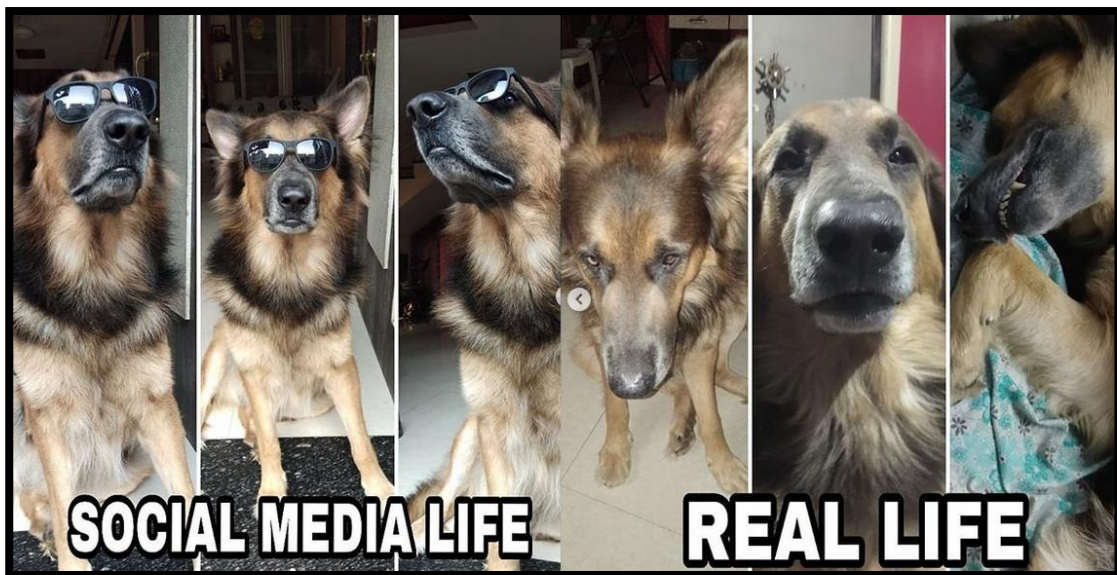
They can cause a weeping wound and swelling if they penetrate through the paws. The awns also cling to animal hair and only move forward – and burrow in – due to the fine barbs on each seed.

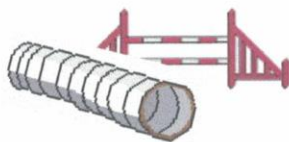
“I've done extensive surgeries tracking barley grass through dog's bodies. One procedure took four hours, the incision was over 18 inches long.” she said.

When she moved to North New Brighton two years ago. Wright checked out dog parks in the vicinity: Bexley, Rawhiti Domain and Horseshoe Lake. She realized Barley Grass was an issue and alerted the city council, as she had previously done with Waimakariri District council staff when living in North Canterbury. “They sent out a ranger (in 2019), emailed them some photos and nothing has happened”. she said. “I could see there was a problem and this year it's booming. It's at a height that a medium to large dog runs through that grass at face level”.

Wright said the best solution is to rip out the barley grass. “Its and annual so it is very shallow rooted, pulling them out is by far the easiest solution. Just throw them in a sack and burn them. The worst thing you can do it just mow it. It just scatters the seeds further”.

The city council's community parks manager Al Hardy said the rangers control the barley grass at the Bexley dog park on an annual basis. With the most recent monitoring carried out on November 5th.

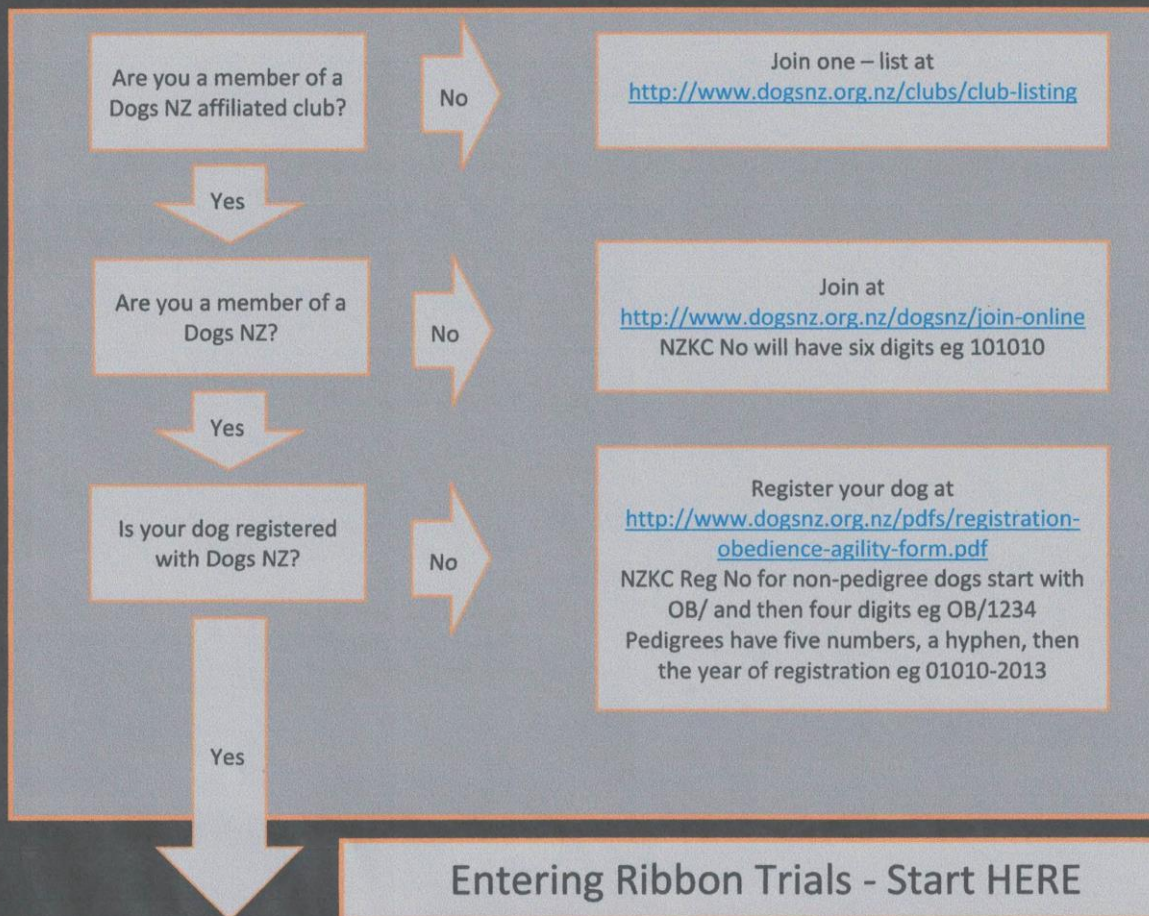

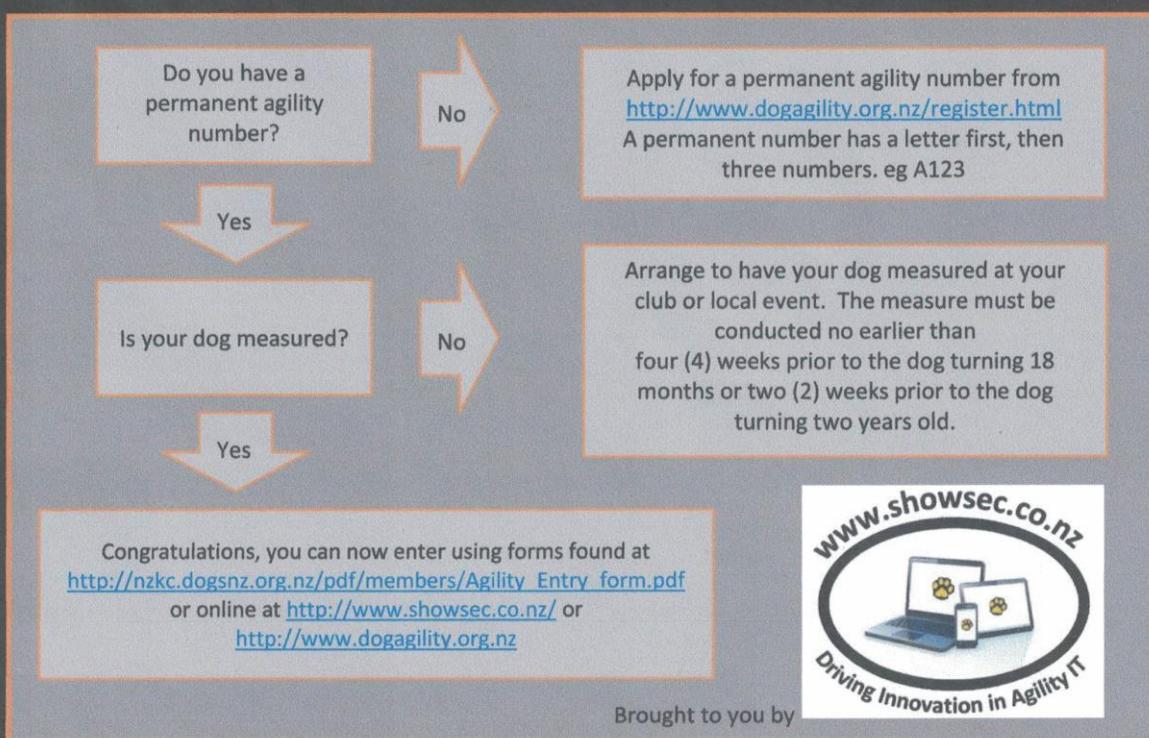
